JOY IN LOVE

Jesus answered, "... Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." [Mark 29-31]

Many have said that this quotation sums up the essence of the whole Bible and our Christian faith.

We prove our love for God and grow in the knowledge and depth of his unfathomable love by embracing the way of the cross each day. When our will crosses with God's will, then His will must be done. ***Oh, how I love your law! All day long I meditate on it. Your words are sweeter in my mouth than honey!*** [Psalm 119:97, 103]

If we accept God's way of love, truth, and wisdom, then we will discover the joy and freedom of loving, serving, and laying down our lives for others, just as Jesus freely laid down his life for each and every one of us. ***"God so loved the world that he gave us his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life"*** (John 3:16).

Paul reminds us ***"God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us"*** [Romans 5:5]. Jesus gave his disciples and us a new commandment to love and serve others just as He has loved us with heartfelt compassion, kindness, and mercy. Our love for God responds to His crazy love for us through the gift of his Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

How can love lead to joy? Joy comes from total commitment to Jesus and our neighbour. Jesus tells his disciples that he is united with his Father in heaven in a perfect bond of mutual love, honour, and joy in one another. Their love is inseparable and unbreakable (1 Peter 1:3-9). Twelve Reasons For Wanting To Spend One Hour With Jesus In The Blessed Sacrament According To The Teachings Of The Church

1. You are greatly needed!

"The Church and the world have a great need of eucharistic adoration." (Pope John Paul II, Dominicae Cenae)

2. This is a personal invitation to you from Jesus.

"Jesus waits for us in this sacrament of love." (Pope John Paul II, Dominicae Canae)

3. Jesus is counting on you because the Eucharist is the center of life.

"Every member of the Church must be vigilant in seeing that the sacrament of love shall be at the center of the life of the people of God so that through all the manifestations of worship due him shall be given back 'love for love' and truly become the life of our souls." (Pope John Paul II, Redeemer of Man)

4. Your hour with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament will repair the evils of the world and bring about peace on earth.

"Let us be generous with our time in going to meet Jesus and ready to make reparation for the great evils of the world. Let your adoration never cease." (Pope John Paul II, Dominicae Cenae)

5. Day and night Jesus dwells in the Blessed Sacrament because you are the most important person in the world to him!

"Christ is revered in our churches as the spiritual center of the heart of the community, the universal Church and all humanity, since within the veil of the species, Christ is contained, the invisible heart of the Church, the Redeemer of the world, the center of all hearts, by him all things are and of whom we exist." (Pope Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei)

6. Jesus wants you to do more than to go to mass on Sunday.

"Our communal worship at mass must go together with our personal worship of Jesus in Eucharistic adoration in order that our love may be complete." (Pope John Paul II, Redeemer of Man)

7. You grow spiritually with each moment you spend with Jesus!

"Our essential commitment in life is to preserve and advance constantly in Eucharistic life and Eucharistic piety and to grow spiritually in the climate of the Holy Eucharist." (Pope John Paul II, Redeemer of Man)

8. The best time you spend on earth is with Jesus, your Best Friend, in the Blessed Sacrament!

"How great is the value of conversation with Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, for there is nothing more consoling on earth, nothing more efficacious for advancing along the road of holiness!" (Pope Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei)

9. Just as you can't be exposed to the sun without receiving its rays, neither can you come to Jesus exposed in the Blessed Sacrament without receiving the divine rays of his grace, his love, his peace.

"Christ is truly the Emmanuel, that is, God with us, day and night, he is in our midst. He dwells with us full of grace and truth. He restores morality, nourishes virtue, consoles the afflicted, strengthens the weak." (Pope Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei)

10. If Jesus were actually visible in church, everyone would run to welcome him, but he remains hidden in the Sacred Host under the appearance of bread, because he is calling us to faith, that we many come to him in humility.

"The Blessed Sacrament is the 'Living Heart' of each of our churches and it is our very sweet duty to honor and adore the Blessed Host, which our eyes see, the Incarnate Word, whom they cannot see." (Pope Paul VI, Credo of the People of God)

11. With transforming mercy, Jesus makes our heart one with his.

"He proposes his own example to those who come to him, that all may learn to be like himself, gentle and humble of heart, and to seek not their own interest but those of God." (Pope Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei)

12. If the Pope himself would give you a special invitation to visit him in the Vatican, this honor would be nothing in comparison to the honor and dignity that Jesus himself bestows upon you with the invitation of spending one hour with him in the Blessed Sacrament.

"The divine Eucharist bestows upon the Christian people the incomparable dignity." (Pope Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei)

Twelve Biblical Reasons For Wanting To Spend One Hour With Jesus In The Blessed Sacrament

1. He is really there!

"I myself am the living bread come down from heaven." (Jn 6:35)

2. Day and night Jesus dwells in the Blessed Sacrament because of his Infinite love for you!

"Behold I will be with you always even to the end of the world," because "I have loved you with an everlasting love, and constant is my affection for you." (Mt 28:20; Jer 31:3)

3. The specific way that Jesus asks you to love him in return is to spend one quiet hour with him in the Blessed Sacrament.

"Where your treasure is, there is your heart...." "Could you not watch one hour with me?" (Matthew 6:21; 26:40)

4. When you look upon the Sacred Host, you look upon Jesus, the Son of God.

"Indeed, this is the will of my Father, that everyone who looks upon the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life. Him I will raise up on the last day." (John 6:40)

5. Each moment that you spend in His Eucharistic Presence will increase his divine life within you and deepen your personal relationship and friendship with Him.

"I have come that you may have life, and have it more abundantly." "I am the vine and you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him shall bear much fruit because without me, you can do nothing." (John 15:5)

6. Each hour you spend with Jesus will deepen his divine peace in your heart.

"Come to me all of you who are weary and find life burdensome and I will refresh you..." "Cast all of your anxieties upon the one who cares for you..." "My Peace is My Gift to you." (Matthew 11:28; Peter 5:7; John 14:17)

"The Lamb on the throne will shepherd them. He will lead them to the springs of life-giving water." (Revelation 7:17)

8. Jesus is infinitely deserving of our unceasing thanksgiving and adoration for all he has done for our salvation.

11. Jesus will bless you, your family and the whole world for this hour of faith you spend with Him in the Blessed Sacrament.

PORTRAIT OF CHRIST IN THE AFRICAN CHURCH

It is widely prevalent to see the presence of European images or white paintings/portraits of Jesus deep-rooted in every major church in the African society. We also see some of the Blessed Virgin Mary, The Twelve Disciples, and many other great religious figures. The only reason we have whole-heartedly accepted and ascribed to these European representational arts is the fact that our former enslaver/oppressor taught us to buy into them with every space of our mind.

When we talk about the depiction of Christ it is imperative not to ascribe any longer to the European depictions of what and how the Messiah looks like because it has come with vicious psychological implications on ourselves as African people. The human brain is an organ with connective cells which capture information as well as recapture memories. Therefore, if the African congregation, especially children are made to believe Jesus is 'white' which they find evidence in portraits in our churches, as time goes by their brain associates 'White Christ' with 'white people'.

Subconsciously, it makes the African congregation put 'white people' closer to God or see them as gods of humanity because "the power in the portrait/painting is transferred to the people who are represented in it"- Dr. Umar Johnson. In effect, the African congregation become easily prone to self-inferiority as it is always difficult to pray with a 'white' mental image of Christ and not in some way feel inferior to 'white people'.

I have questioned and have had several discussions on this topic with many of our priests and other ministers. The dominant response from those interactions has been that "It does not really matter how Christ is racially represented/misrepresented in portrait" and that "What is all important is to worship and serve the Lord as well as to seek spiritual growth in Him". But the reality is, it does matter. As a society, we are well aware of the power of representation and its impact on our perception of reality. If it does not matter, why are we not displaying the early and original portraits of Christ and other Christian figures instead in our churches? If it never mattered, why were many of the original paintings and ancient mosaics of Jesus systematically reconstructed globally with European features which have now become the conventional depiction of what Christ looks like? – Dr. Robinson Milwood

It is tough to oppress/gain hegemony over a people whose image of the Messiah does not look like the oppressor. But when the Messiah and the oppressor look same, the people will come to believe that the oppression is ordained by God. It was not surprising but sad when I came across a video of an African lawmaker/preacher in America saying "...I thank God for slavery...If it was not for it, I would be somewhere in Africa worshipping a tree". I do not know how you would describe that statement, but it is an authoritative exposition of ignorance and self-hatred and this is the situation many of us have found ourselves in. Now do you realise how representation matters and jointly with history and culture?

It will stimulate curiosity in Africans who enjoy the ostentation and delineation of 'white' European Jesus Christ to realise there still exists today, a few thousands of original portraits of Jesus Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary around the world especially in Europe and Russia. Dr. Runoko Rashidi in his book, *Blackstar: The African Presence in Early Europe*, reveals that France probably has more depictions of black Madonna with infant Jesus than any other country. A chief centre of which is Chartres - 5 to 8 kilometers southwest of Paris. Notable among the depictions in Chartres is the Notre-Dame du Phlier (Our Lady of the Pillar). Both the Madonna and infant Jesus are colored

in very dark brown and the images are highly venerated, especially among Catholics.

With the evidence of the facts crystal-clear, one could only ask why the public is less exposed to this knowledge. We can only conclude it is due to the relentless process of deculturalisation and deAfricanisation of our history as well as buying more into Eurocentric literature/academia which we African people have held high for eons.

Albeit I seek justifications to my assertions from historical facts, it is also worth stating that it just seems appropriate to represent Christ in our own kind and the psychology that follows would even draw us much closer to God and strengthen our faith in Him.

"What we do for ourselves depends on what we think of ourselves and what we think of ourselves depends on what we know of ourselves and what we know of ourselves depends on what we have been told"- Dr. Runoko Rashidi. Never should we allow anybody to tell us history and culture are not important. "Religion is part of our culture, otherwise it is not a religion" - Most Rev. Peter Kwasi Sarpong.

Archbishop Emeritus of the Kumasi Archdiocese of the Catholic Church, Most Rev. Peter Kwasi Sarpong has argued that the African Church is not 'African enough' and continues to urge that symbols, imagery, signs, etc. that are remnants of other cultures should be replaced by those comprehensible to the African. He further enumerates aspects of convergence between Christianity and indigenous African religions such as godliness, religious authority, veneration of ancestors, virtues of respect, hospitality, purity, truth, hard work, and rites of passage or ceremonies surrounding the "life cycle".

The Archbishop Emeritus is not alone in this perspective as Prof. Jean-Marc Ela also believes that for the Christian gospel to worth its salt in Africa, the local people must take hold of Christianity and interpret it with their own sensibilities to confront new social, economic, and religious realities. According to Ela, faith is verified and actualized wherever the future is striven for and invented, in all of society's tension spots. "Unless it takes into account of economics as well as realities of power and the correlative realities of powerlessness, faith is discarnate".

The moment is now for us to look deeply into some of these issues that border on the socio-cultural status quo of the African church, which have always been treated with disdain and insignificance, and have left our consciousness in disarray and our confidence inanimate. Despite the Vatican II decrees which encourage indigenization in the Church, it is of socio-historical interest that we must initiate major liturgical reforms in consultation with the Holy See.

May the good Lord guide and lead us to the trajectory of faith, wisdom, and knowledge in our salvation, rehabilitation, and liberation.
